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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Chandannagar, situated on the western bank of the river Hooghly, is part of a unique and significant stretch of riverine civilization which has been the site of European trading posts and colonies from the 16th century. Over the last four centuries, this region, consisting of Bandel, Chinsura, Chandernagore and Serampore has hosted the Dutch, the Portuguese, the Danish, the French and of course the English traders and colonialists, earning for itself the moniker of '*Little Europe*'. Chandernagore College bears testament to this rich historical context. The institution traces its origin back to the establishment of the **St. Mary's Institution, established by the Jesuit priest M. Magloire Barthet in 1862**. Since then the institution gradually evolved first into *École Publique de Garçons* and began the teaching of the **First Arts (F.A.) Course in 1891 under the aegis of the University of Calcutta** and later developed into **College Duplex (1901)**. At this point, the college was directly administered by the erstwhile French Government of Chandernagore. However, the **college was closed in 1908 owing to the escalation of revolutionary nationalist activities and only re-opened in 1931, after a gap of 23 years**. Since 1931, the College Duplex began to offer Intermediate Courses in Arts and Science, under the aegis of the University of Calcutta and the **first graduate courses started in 1947**. By then the college had been renamed College de Bussy and it continued as such even after 15th August 1947 when India became independent. Chandernagore became a Free City in November 1947 and that led to the rechristening of College de Bussy as Chandernagore College. After the formal integration of Chandernagore into India, the city came under the Government of West Bengal on **2nd October 1954** and Chandernagore College came under the control of the state administration. Since then, the college has continued to grow and currently teaches undergraduate and postgraduate students across 19 disciplines. It also has the unique distinction of being the only college in West Bengal where French is taught at the Under-Graduate and Post-Graduate levels. It has been accredited B++ twice by NAAC. The College has been recognized under **Section 2(f) and eligible for receiving central assistance (UGC grant) under Section 12 (B) of UGC Act**. The College has been awarded grants from **RUSA 2.0**, fundings from research projects and development grants from Higher Education Department, GoWB. In the recent past, keeping in mind the rich history of the College and Chandernagore, **Centre for Heritage Studies and Chandernagore College Museum** have been established for the preservation and promotion of the social and cultural heritage. Under the aegis of the Central Sanskrit University, Government of India, the college has also established a **Non-formal Sanskrit Education Centre for inculcating Indian Knowledge System** in the community.

College has established a **Centre for Heritage Studies** and **Chandernagore College Museum** for promoting **academic and research activities on heritage and Indian knowledge system**.
2. **Infrastructure and academic environment:** Existence of favourable academic environment with good ambiance and clean environment with well-maintained infrastructural facility in the campus.
3. **Quality management:** Highly qualified **Teachers with** different specialized fields are recruited strictly following the UGC and State government rules and regulations. Students' admission is strictly merit-based.
4. **Geographical location:** Geographical location is advantageous.
5. **Academics: Diversity of learning 19 subjects** under regular curriculum is offered.
6. **Library:** Library equipped with a rich & large archival section, **digital cataloguing facilities**, subscription to **different academic and research based e-resources**.
7. **Mentoring:** Pleasant relationship between the students – teachers.
8. **Capacity Building activities:** Regular **organization of seminars, capacity building and skill enhancement programmes, entrepreneurship generating programmes** for the holistic development of the students.
9. **Add-ons and Certificate Courses:** The College provides **Add-on and certificate courses beyond curriculum** offered to all students for opening up better opportunities for them.
10. **Collaborative activities:** Collaborative activities through MoUs and linkages with different expert **institutions and industries for providing multi-interdisciplinary and practical knowledge up-gradation as well as promote critical thinking and innovative approach of learning** for all.
11. **Students' achievements:** Evidence of inclusive education with **minimum drop out ratio**. The academic performances in terms of **pass-out percentage, progression to higher studies as well as placement in services** are appreciable. Besides, the students also **receive awards and recognitions** in different curricular and extra-curricular activities.

This helps the institution to identify the diverse ideas of thinking inclusively and globally as well as promote better personal and professional growth among the students.

14. **Environmental awareness and protection activities** through:

 - **Plastic-free campus.**
 - **Neat and clean campus environment** through **regular management of the wastes** in collaboration with Chandernagore Municipal Corporation.
 - **Mangrove plantation in multiple phases** in the Hooghly River Bank at Chandannagar.
 - **Institutional Social Responsibility:** Different Extension and Social Outreach programmes in the form of *Joyful learning and Haate-kolome Vigyan* with the neighbouring schools.
15. **Feedbacks: Feedbacks from its stakeholders** analysed and necessary action taken for improvement.
16. **Alumni:** The College has a rich and reputed Alumni established in their expertise areas in life. Moreover, the registered **Chandernagore College Alumni Association** organizes different social, academic cultural activities as well as provides financial support for the development of the College.

Institutional Weakness

Institutional weaknesses

1. Lack of scopes in **formulating the curricular contents** of the programmes.
2. **Lack of Adequate Supporting Staff:** Compared to the number of departments and students, the number of supporting staff is inadequate. This considerably affects the smooth execution of academic activities.
3. Lack of curricular scopes for **tie-up with industries** for enabling more practical based teaching-learning opportunities.
4. **Limited seats in Girls' Hostel** of the College to facilitate boarding of more girls students coming from distant and remote rural places.
5. **Administrative Autonomy** As Chandernagore College is a government institution; the drive for its quality improvement is hindered by the lack of full administrative autonomy. Financial limitations restrict the college from designing a new programme to providing global exposure to students like student exchange programmes as well as provide adequate financial supports for research to its faculty members.
6. A **Green Audit** was conducted and total carbon footprints in the college were estimated. Even though the college has installed solar power plants, promoted usage of LCD tubes, more energy efficiency projects and self waste treatment plant are needed for making the college carbon negative.
7. **Service Transfer of the Faculty members** often disturbs the curriculum plan of the Departments during the course of full-fledged academic session.

Institutional Opportunity

1. Possibility of **introducing more varieties of beyond curriculum based Add-on programmes and Skill-oriented Certificate Courses.**
2. Possibility of **generation and utilization of more solar energy** in the campus through financial support from the authority.
3. Faculty members have the potentiality to **achieve more research projects and publications.**
4. **Strengthening of remedial and tutorial classes**, conduct periodical class tests for providing **additional support to the slow learners** for better progression at UG level.
5. **Conduct more Extension and Social Outreach programmes** as a part of **Institutional Social Responsibility** in periodic phases.
6. Possibility of **creating e-content by teachers** through up-gradation of the available e-learning aids.
7. New Education Policy opened up an opportunity for the college to **execute inter-disciplinary/ multidisciplinary based research and academic activities** for the students and teachers.
8. **Centre for Heritage Studies of Chandernagore College and the College Museum open up the opportunities for research** in the domain of Heritage and Culture in the Local and Global Platforms.
9. **Non-formal Sanskrit Education Centre in Chandernagore College** provides an opportunity for **expanding the horizon of Indian Knowledge System.**

INSTITUTIONAL CHALLENGES

1. To **establish Academic Collaborations with Reputed Institutions & Industries** for better career opportunities for our students.
2. To **organize regular recruitment programmes** for offering more placement opportunities to the passing-out students of the college.
3. **Organization of national seminars and minor/major research** hindered by paucity of funding.
4. Though there is a favourable teacher-student ratio, the **current staff strength is not adequate** for the smooth conduct of the additional functions in the college.
5. **Complying to a rapidly changing world** with cutting-edge technology.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Chandernagore College offers **19 Undergraduate courses** including B.A, B.Sc. and B.Com Programmes in Honours, General and **3 Post Graduate Programmes** following the **Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)** designed by the University of Burdwan since 2017.

Curriculum delivery

- Every department has a fairly implemented **curriculum plan** that is effectively delivered to the students according to the **academic calendar** prepared by the college. Honours and General courses in English,

Philosophy, Sociology, Sanskrit, Economics and Political Science under the Bachelor of Arts programme include tutorial classes in the ratio of 5:1 in a credit-based system of 6. Some undergraduate courses in Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Environmental Science and Computer Science also include tutorial classes in the same ratio of 5:1 in their curriculum delivery programme. **Project work and excursion** programmes along with **educational tours** are organized by a few departments for effective delivery of the curriculum.

Continuous Internal Evaluation

- Continuous Internal Evaluation is conducted by the departments to ensure that students understand their lessons. The college also arranges co-curricular activities and mentoring sessions for the benefit and improvement of students.

Add-on Courses

- Chandernagore College has offered **24 Add-on Courses** and **5 Certificate Courses** in the last 5 years starting from the academic session 2018 to 2023. These Add-on Courses with the objective of developing some employable skills have well-framed syllabi beyond the purview of the existing syllabus of The University of Burdwan and have attracted students in large numbers.

Crosscutting Issues

- The Institution skillfully integrates issues of **Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values and Environmental Sustainability** to help students cope with the challenges of modern living. **The crosscutting issues** of professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability are well integrated, assimilated and reflected in the existing curriculum with the aim of its enrichment.

Feedback

- The College has collected and analyzed **feedback** through standard questionnaire from various stakeholders like students, teachers, alumni and employers on various aspects of curriculum delivery, institutional infrastructure, laboratories, library facilities, ICT facilities, office facilities and other support services of the institution. Based on the analysis of the feedback reports the college has **taken action** in the past 5 years.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Chandernagore College has exhibited a robust commitment to enhance the **Teaching-Learning and Evaluation Processes** within its academic framework.

Admission (Enrollment)

- The College follows a free, fair, transparent online **Admission process** as per the **Admission circulars and Reservation policies of the State Government and University of Burdwan**. **First year Enrollment (Admission) Percentage (overall) and from the Reserved categories are 65% and**

62% respectively over the last 5 years.

Students-Teacher ratio

- The College has an extremely **healthy Students-Teacher ratio of 21:1 (last completed Academic year)**, ensuring a dedicated and devoted teaching-learning environment.

ICT infrastructure

- The College has a plethora of **ICT infrastructure** including LMS, Language lab, KOHA, Inflight subscription, Projectors (for presentations), High-speed internet, updated-configuration computers and many others for providing quality education to students.

Experiential, Participative and Problem-solving Teaching-Learning methodologies

- The College effectively stresses upon promoting **experiential, participative and problem-solving teaching-learning methodologies** by conducting practical classes, projects and dissertations, field trips, seminars, workshops, hands-on trainings, add-on and certificate courses. Community engagement, extension activities, students' seminars, debates, competitions and other co-curricular activities assist in knowledge-gaining of students.

Faculty Profile and Strength

- The College has a vast **human-resource pool of Faculty members** representing both youth and experience. **90% of Full-time sanctioned posts of Faculty members are filled as per UGC guidelines. 82% of Full-time Faculty members are qualified with NET/SLET/Ph.D. degrees.**

Internal and External Examinations

- The College conducts **Internal and External examinations** as per University regulations. It maintains a robust Internal Assessment mechanism monitored centrally by the Examination committees. Departments conduct Academic progress meetings to ascertain the students' progress, syllabus completion. The college has developed its online portal "*Collosol*" which was effectively used during the pandemic for Internal examinations.

Examination-oriented Grievances

- Students can register their **Examination-oriented grievances** through Departments (which are reflected in Departmental grievance reports), Grievance Redressal Committee, Principal's office, Examination committees, SPIO which are resolved in a timely, just, humane manner. Students can apply for **Review of their published Results**.

In the **last five years, 75.45% of students** received different scholarships and freeships.
 - **During Covid-19 pandemic**, all of our enrolled students for the University Examinations were entitled to **50% freeship** of their Examination Fees.
- **Capacity Building and Skill Enhancement Programmes:**
 - Chandernagore College designed many Capacity Building and Skill Enhancement Programmes to improve students' capabilities, knowledge, and competencies for competitive examinations. In total more than **60 events were organized in last 5 years**.
 - College has signed **MoU to collaborate with a number of academic organizations/ institutes, industries** to provide better career opportunities.
 - Faculty members of our college **constantly motivate and guide our students** for their academic as well as professional career.

- **Students Progression and Placement:**
 - Results of our students are quite impressive. An appreciable number of our students regularly got admission for Higher Education and qualified different competitive Examinations like NET, SET, GATE, JAM, etc. **In last five years these numbers are 1194 and 459** respectively.
 - Our pass-out students have achieved placements in different Government and non-Government organizations. **In last five years more than 400 students got placement** and remarkably only **in the academic session 2022-23, this number is 258.**
- **Awards and achievements:**
 - College motivates active participation of students in different co-curricular and extra-curricular activities by providing supporting aids. A number of gold medals and ranks have been bagged by our students along with **6 international, 11 national and 52 state level awards/medals in last five years.**
- **Organized Grievance Redressal Mechanism:**
 - College has **functional, well-organized regulatory committees for awareness, prevention and addressing of grievances** related to ragging, sexual harassment of students.

Multidisciplinary subject combination range was although specified by the University of Burdwan, College has taken its due preparation prior to that through proper modification of class routine structure to accommodate the multidisciplinary classes. Faculty members have also prepared their content/ study materials as per the requirement of students from different target streams. Teaching methodologies were also prepared to meet the interdisciplinary section of students. The college also promotes interdisciplinary activities and conducts various research and academic activities including seminars, workshops, hands-on trainings, faculty exchange-student exchange programmes, through active involvement of different departments and collaborating organizations such as ESTUARINE AND COASTAL STUDIES FOUNDATION (ECSF), INTEGRATED INSTITUTE FOR ADVANCED RESEARCH AND INFORMATION (IIARI), iLEAD Kolkata and Women's Polytechnic College, Chandernagore. Chandernagore College also publishes a Multidisciplinary peer- reviewed Journal in Humanities and Social Sciences named TRIVIUM in Humanities and Social Sciences to encourage research among the faculty members and students of the college.</p>

Academic bank of credits (ABC):</p>	<p>As an initiative for preparedness relating to NEP 2020 among the Students, Faculty Members and Staff members, and to spread awareness about Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) based on DigiLocker Framework, a One Day Workshop on Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) based on DigiLocker Framework' has been organized on 29.05.2023 (Monday) 12.00 noon at Charu Chandra Roy Memorial Hall, Main Campus, Chandernagore College. Dr. Pradip Kumar Roy, Nodal Officer, National Academic Depository, The University of Burdwan was invited as the Resource Person to enlighten our students and teachers about the importance and utility of Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) based on DigiLocker. The participants were trained in the procedure for handling of DigiLocker (a depository of documents in digital form) so as to facilitate the same for the entire pools of students of</p>

the College within a short period of time to enjoy its ultimate benefits. In addition various guidelines and demonstrating videos have been circulated which lucidly outlines the procedures of installation of ADC Digilocker and methods of uploading documents therein the app. The College had initially created a Committee of faculty members to manage, handle and supervise the activities of the students for successful registration and maintaining of Digilocker accounts. The faculty supervising unit have constantly mentored the students for overcoming any troubleshoot that the students faced while creating their Digilocker Id. Hence this national level initiative was duly percolated among the students as an effort for NEP 2020.

3. Skill development:

As per the curriculum under CBCS and NEP 2020, Chandernagore College follows the syllabi under The University of Burdwan which contain skill enhancement courses for the students in various subjects. College has also taken additional initiatives to organize various skill development activities in the form of capacity building programmes in collaboration with expert organizations to motivate and equip our students for their holistic development. Yoga and Karate trainers have been appointed and regular classes have been allotted in the routine to promote these life skill activities among the students. In addition, workshops, field trainings, hands-on training, industrial trips and trainings, certificate courses on various topics have been conducted in collaboration with various organizations, industries and agencies have been conducted to expose the students beyond the class room teaching, make familiar with the practical working environment as well as promote entrepreneurship generating opportunities for the students. IQAC proposed to introduce Add-on courses by all the departments mandatorily for all students of the college to give them exposure beyond curriculum. Certificate courses on Finance and Accounting such as Certificate course on Tax Package, Certificate course on Accounting Package, Certificate Course on Digital Still Photography, Certificate Course on Heritage Tourism, Certificate Course under Non Formal Sanskrit Education, have been jointly conducted with master organizations Tally Institute, ICA Edu Skill, Vertex Digital Studio, Murshidabad Heritage

Development Society to provide the students the best opportunities for skill enhancement in these professional sectors and promote entrepreneurship generation scopes for them. Partial digital cataloguing of the Central Library has been successfully deployed with financial assistance from the RUSA 2.0 scheme. Further digitization is planned. The catalogue can also be accessed 24x7 online. Students can also access e-resources on INFLIBNET to promote better learning skill. To promote value education among the students and to encourage them to take part in social outreach activities of the college, MoUs were signed with different Social organizations like an orphan's home "Goswami Ghat Prabartak Aponaloy Boys Home", SANGBED and others. To grow environmental awareness, develop the knowledge of segregation of different wastes among the students and make them familiar with the waste management system, Chandernagore College signed a MoUs with Chandernagore Municipal Corporation and conducted seminars, field visits for exposing the students to waste management systems via practical demonstrations. The college also promotes interdisciplinary research activities for skill development through organization of seminars, workshops, hands-on trainings, faculty exchange-student exchange programmes, involving different departments and professional collaborating organizations such as ESTUARINE AND COASTAL STUDIES FOUNDATION), INTEGRATED INSTITUTE FOR ADVANCED RESEARCH AND INFORMATION), iLEAD, Kolkata, Women's Polytechnic College, Chandernagore. Collaboration with Murshidabad Heritage Society starts a Certificate Course on 'Heritage Tourism' provides a scope to the students for inculcate the Indian knowledge system Faculty member of Sanskrit Department, Chandernagore College applied for a Major Research Project on 'Bharatiyadarshanadrishtya Manastattvavivekah' Indian Knowledge System Division and received the Major Research Project recently worth Rs. 14,38,500/- Medical Plant Garden based on traditional Indian knowledge is established and maintained by department of Botany, Chandernagore College. Observation of important days related to traditional Indian language like Bengali through "Bhasha Divas" on 21st February. Students were sensitized regarding the Indian knowledge System- its philosophy, various tenets of Sanskrit language through organization of various seminars by Department of Sanskrit.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Chandernagore College promotes Outcome based education (OBE) through emphasizing on student-centric learning processes for imparting knowledge, skills, lifelong learning experiences and independent problem-solving of the learners. **LEARNING METHODOLOGIES:** Learner centric teaching approach plays a prime role in transforming passive participants to become active in the teaching learning environment. In practical teaching, provides a better scope of learning at their best and personal level by ensuring their active involvement through learning. Interactive modes of teaching-learning through Audio-Visual aids, LMS, Study tour and field visits encourage the students in experiential and participative learning. Project based learning, Educational excursions, engages students in collaborative real-world problem solving tasks and

develops soft skill and cooperative attitude among themselves. Students' participation in various activities such as seminars, group discussions, induction programmes, brainstorming sessions, workshops, on the job trainings, capacity building programmes, job oriented certificate courses, career counselling activities are the prime tools for assessing the outcomes of the learning experiences.

WEBSITE- the outcomes of all the courses under curriculum across the various programmes are documented by the teaching departments. A uniform structured Course-Outcome, Programme Specific Outcome tabular format is prepared by all the Departments and are collated together to form a consolidated document. It is mandatory for the faculty to formulate Course Outcomes (COs) describing what every student should be able to learn and grasp at the end of any particular course. These enlist the knowledge and skills that would be expected to be possessed by a student, in a particular subject, upon successful completion of their undergraduate honours and postgraduate courses.

EVALUATION OF COURSE OUTCOME AND PROGRAMME SPECIFIC OUTCOME- Realisation of the objectives specified for a Programme and a Course is assessed from teacher's perspective as well as from the students achievement in the End Semester Examination. **REVIEW MEETING BY FACULTY MEMBERS FOR ASSESSMENT OF STUDENTS REALISATION OF OBJECTIVES-**

Post Internal examination usually departments conduct a review meeting to discuss and ascertain the further course of action for facilitation of students' achievement especially for weaker section of students. Teaching Learning process is criteria based rather than norm based, so that emphasis is given on achievement of cognitive, affective and psychomotor skills and not simply numerical score of marks.

Curriculum Planning and Delivery

- Chandernagore College offers **19 Undergraduate Courses** including B. A, B.Sc. & B. Com Programmes in Honours and General along with **3 Post Graduate** Programmes following the **Choice Based Credit System (CBCS)** designed by the **University of Burdwan** since 2017. The teachers who are members of **University Board of Studies** are invited to offer suggestions to the University on curriculum framing.
- Every department has an extensive, robust and fairly implemented **Curriculum Plan** that is effectively delivered to the students according to the **Academic Calendar** prepared by the IQAC in consultation with the institutional authority. The **Academic Calendar** of the college follows the academic calendar of the University. The calendar displays tentative dates of commencement of sessions, internal exams, Government holidays along with dates of important events. The college has adhered to the academic calendar in the past, the only exception being the year of Covid 19 pandemic.

Mechanism for Curriculum delivery

- **The Routine Committee** prepares class schedules in the form of Master Routine prioritizing the needs of various departments. At the beginning of each semester the tentative teaching plan is shared with the students. The students become aware of syllabus distribution by the departmental teachers. The faculty members maintain class records, make strategies to complete the syllabus within the stipulated time. The teaching plan is meticulously prepared by the teachers and maintained by the teachers in the repository of the **Learning Management System (LMS)** which can be accessed by the students.
- **Project work, excursions and field surveys** are organized by a few departments for comprehensive delivery of the curriculum. Students learn easily through these empirical techniques. **ICT based teaching learning** methods with audio-visual aids help students to have a better understanding of the subject matter of the courses.
- **Continuous Internal Evaluation** is conducted by the departments to ensure that students understand their lessons. The process of internal evaluation of students has improved a lot in the last few years. The college arranges mentoring sessions for improvement of students Regular **Departmental meetings** and **Parent Teacher Meeting (PTM)** have been conducted in the last 5 years for the benefit of the students. The college has an inclusive environment and is ever sensitive to the needs of **specialty-abled students** and slow learners.
- **The library** which is a repository of a number of books and journals including E-books and

journals is of special help to learners. The KOHA software in the library smoothly enables students to access the catalogues. The library also provides OPAC (Online Public Access Catalogues) facilities for its users.

- **Wall magazines** prepared by students of a few departments reflect their awareness of academic and contemporary issues. Students are encouraged to listen to invited lectures and participate in webinars and seminars on subject of their study along with other interdisciplinary topics to provide them conceptual clarity on their subject.

In short, the institution provides a holistic and inclusive learning environment for overall development of the learners' personality which perhaps is more important than acquiring degrees in the long run.

Committed to the purpose of providing a comprehensive learning experience to the students, Chandernagore College has tried to create an academic environment which skillfully integrates the crosscutting issues of Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values and Environmental Sustainability in the existing curriculum with the aim of its enrichment.

Professional Ethics

Although Professional Ethics has been a part of the curriculum of Economics and Commerce, all the departments of the college have taken special initiatives to organize seminars and lectures on **Intellectual Property Rights (IPR)**. Special seminar on Ethics has been organized to sensitize students and teachers. Thus, issue of Professional Ethics has been well incorporated into the curriculum of all courses of arts, Commerce and Science.

Human Values

Human Values has been the thrust area in the curriculum of Education, Philosophy and Political Science.

Students actively participate in NSS activities with the purpose of spreading values of helping others through various outreach programmes which range from **celebrating commemorative days** to **helping destitute children** in and around Chandernagore. All these programmes indirectly help students to inculcate values of sharing and helping.

NSS has actively participated in social outreach programmes to promote human values of integration and harmony.

Gender

The college addresses the issue of Gender Equality through its courses. There are discussions on gender rights, gender-based violence, gender and work creating gender sensitization among students and teachers of the college.

Gender inclusive core courses are part of the curriculum of Sociology, English, History, Bengali, Political Science and Geography. These core courses address social construction of gender with special emphasis on gender and work, gender and violence and gender and polity. They explain how gender ideologies play a major role in defining gendered relations in the place of work, in the field of politics as well as in the family.

Programmes on gender sensitization are organized by various departments along with IQAC to inculcate gender inclusive values beyond the horizon of the prescribed curricula. Students organize programmes on Woman's Day to discuss issues on rights and status of women in our society.

Environment and its Sustainability

Environment and its Sustainability has been specially addressed in the curriculum of Botany, Zoology, Environmental Science, Geography and The Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course 1 (AECC1). The purpose of this course is to develop a comprehensive understanding of global environmental challenges among the students and help them develop into socially responsible and environmentally conscious human beings.

In order to promote values of environmental sustainability the college has taken the following initiative:

- The college has introduced **energy saving devices like solar panels**.
- **Rain water Harvesting** and **vermicomposting plant** are examples of the way the college addresses the issue of environmental sustainability.
- Chandernagore College is the only institution that has taken **special initiative to undertake mangrove plantation** along the banks of the Ganges to familiarize students with the **importance of soil conservation**.

All these activities prove that the institution holistically integrates values of professional ethics, gender equality, human values and environmental sustainability for a complete and all-inclusive learning.

2. *The Centre for Heritage Studies conducts Heritage walks and visits.*
3. *The College provides Certificates Courses on Digital Phototgraphy and Heritage Tourism apart from the 22 Add-On Courses.*
4. **Several workshops, trainings, seminars have been conducted as part of the 28 MoUs signed by the College. Industry visits, projects like “Know your Ganges”, Waste Management programmes and a plethora of activities have been performed as part of it.**
5. In association with **Central Sanskrit University, Department of Education, GoI**, the College has established a **Non-formal Sanskrit Education Centre for teaching spoken Sanskrit.**
6. **Students’ seminars, Debate competitions, Quiz contests and other co-curricular activities** are organized.
7. **NSS Unit of the College** conducts regular events.
8. **Community Engagement and Extension activities** have been carried out by PG Departments.
9. **Compeitions like Logo designing, Drawing contests** are organized.
10. **Seminars, Workshops, Capacity Building and Skill Enhancement Initiatives** are held in the College regularly to provide participative learning experiences. Special Workshop was held regarding the **implementation of Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) based on DigiLocker Framework (for NEP implementation).**
11. **Wall Magazines** are maintained by the students of many Departments.
12. Students participate in **Youth Parliament** competitions.
13. Days of **National and International importance** are commemorated in the College which enriches students **regarding the History and Culture of India.**
14. **Seminars on Gender issues, Ethics, Value education** are conducted.
15. **Awareness programmes on Blood Donation, Tally, Taxation** are notable amongst a long list of activities conducted.
16. **Yoga, Karate sessions** are held.

Problem Solving Methodologies :

1. Several Departments conduct regular **Practical classes.**
2. Several Departments provide **Project/Dissertation Courses** to their UG or PG students.
3. Faculty members **provide Assignments** to the students and evaluate them.
4. Department of Computer Science students developed **Chat-Bot for College Admission purposes.**
5. **Participation in Google-Cloud Development programmes.**

Chandernagore College believes that along with traditional teaching-learning modes, **new and novel ICT-based methods are necessary for enhancing the learning experiences** of the students.

The following **ICT-based Teaching-Learning methods** are employed at the college –

1. **LMS Software is used to upload the Internal & End-Semester Examination Question Papers, Learning Resources, Model Question Papers and Curriculum plans** for the academic benefit of the students.
2. **Language Laboratory is built for improving the LRSW (Listening, Reading, Speaking and Writing) skills** of the students. It uses specialized Language-learning multimedia-based Software for customized learning and interactive exercises.
3. **Class rooms belonging to Botany (2), Zoology (2), Mathematics (1), Computer Science (1), Geography (2), Room 205, Room 308 (Department of French), Charu Chandra Roy Memorial Hall and Heritage Building Auditorium are ICT-enabled with LCD projectors and screens.**
4. The campus has **high-speed Ethernet-based internet facility and is WIFI enabled.**
5. Departments are **equipped with Desktops and Printers.**
6. **The College has INFLIBNET subscription.**
7. **Library uses the KOHA Library-Management software for books' circulation management.**
8. **Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is maintained and can be accessed.**
9. College website provides **access to reputed Online Open-source E-Learning Resources like National Digital Library, Jstor, Nptel** and others.
10. College has developed a **Web-portal called Collosol.** Students (through Android App) and Faculty members (through Desktop version) use it for receiving College notifications, online class schedules.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

Chandernagore College **has designed its Internal Assessment (IA)** evaluation process in accordance with University circulars. **End-semester (External) Examinations** related modalities, schedules, notifications, centre allocation documents are primarily published by the University, which are circulated and implemented by the College.

- Total Marks for IA is 15 for the Core Courses (CC), Generic Electives (GE) and Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) and 10 for the Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). For all courses C1, C2 components comprised of marks from IA and C3 is the Attendance. According to University Regulations, IA can be in the form of Written Examination/ Assignments / Viva.
- **IA (15 Marks) = C1 (5 Marks) + C2 (5 Marks) + Attendance C3 (5 Marks)**
- Earlier the number of IA was 02 for all the Courses, but since 16/12/2019, the University has reduced it to 01 of 10 marks to increase teaching days.
- **Internal Examinations' related Notifications** are circulated by the Examination committees and they conduct the General Internal Assessments in a centralized way, whereas the Honours Internal Assessments are conducted by the Departments.
- **End-semester (External) Examinations related Enrollment Notifications, Admit Cards, Schedules, Centre allocation lists** are published by the University which in turn are circulated through College Notices (in the website). **Detailed Notifications, Room plans and posters for End-semester Examinations** are published by the College. Practical Examinations are held by the Departments themselves.
- The **Internal, Practical Marks** is preserved by the Departments and **uploaded in the University portal**.

Flowchart and Detailed Summary (Marks Distribution, Frequency, Modalities, Conducting Methodology, Marks preservation, Notifications circulation) for Internal and External Examinations is given in the Report attached.

The students have several options at their disposal for registering grievances related to Internal Assessments and End-Semester Examinations. They are –

1. Departments and Faculties

Aggrieved students can approach their respective Departments and Faculty members with their Grievances and complaints which are solved in turn by the Departments through deliberation in Departmental meetings.

2. Principal's Office

Students can submit Examination related Grievance applications to the Office. They are solved by the Office staff and Annual reports are also prepared.

3. Examination Committee

The students can approach the Examination Committees with their grievances related to Internal examinations like rescheduling requests, Course combination correction etc.

4. Post Results publication Review system

The students can apply for **Review of their Results**. As and when the University publishes review Notifications, the College circulates the Notices online. The Review Submission is done through online mode in the University portal

5. State Public information Officer

Thus any student with queries related to internal examinations can approach the SPIO with an RTI Application under **section 6(1) of RTI Act, 2005**.

6. Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC)

Any student can lodge a Complaint through Email in a specified format given in the College website. The GRC convenes meetings based on it, involving the student(s) along with the connected parties to immediately solve it.

The Departments submit Annual Grievances Reports to the GRC. On the basis of these along with its own activities, the GRC compiles an Annual report.

7. Mentoring Programme

Mentoring sessions are conducted for the UG and PG students where they can express their grievances.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website

Response:

Programme Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are key components of educational programmes in an Institution. POs define the overarching knowledge, skills and attributes that students are expected to attain by the time they complete their programme of study. COs specify the specific learning objectives for individual courses within that Programme.

Chandernagore College believes that a **detailed and comprehensive set of Outcomes and Objectives for broad-based Streams, Programmes and Courses** have to be designed and circulated before the

commencement of the Teaching-Learning process. Thus, a comprehensive set of Objectives, Outcomes and Goals had to be set forth for the students for them to have a clear and vivid understanding of the scope, syllabus, depth and breadth of the Programmes to be pursued by them. The following steps were executed to design the Objectives and Outcomes and ensure their widespread circulation –

- First the concept of **Learning Outcomes (LOs)** in accordance with Bloom’s Taxonomy had to be understood. After that, Chandernagore College initiated the task of designing the **broad-stream based Programme Outcomes (POs)**. The Undergraduate and Postgraduate Programmes were classified into 05 (five) broad-based streams –

1. **B.A. Programmes**
2. **M.A. Programmes**
3. **B.Sc. Programmes**
4. **M.Sc. Programme**
5. **B.Com Programme**

- The **broad-stream based Programme Outcomes (POs)** for the 05 aforementioned broad-based streams were designed by the IQAC.
- After enlisting these **broad-streams based Programme Outcomes (POs)**, the designing phase of the **Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) for the Honours and PG programmes** got initiated. The Faculty Members of all Departments brainstormed to design the PSOs for each of the 19 Undergraduate Honours and Postgraduate Programmes along with the **Course Outcomes (COs) for each of Courses enlisted in the curriculum of the respective Programmes.**
- The College ensured widespread circulation of the **POs, PSOs, COs amongst stakeholders (students and educators) for proper clarity and transparency regarding the objectivity of the entire Teaching-Learning process. Widespread circulation of the designed POs, PSOs, COs are ensured in the following ways -**

1. The centralized PSOs and departmental POs and COs are uploaded in a dedicated web-page **in the College website.**
2. **The College published Notifications (containing the Web-links) for widespread circulation of the PSOs, POs, COs.** The students and their parents can readily access them and gain clarity regarding the objectivity and outcomes of the Programmes.
3. **Faculty members have shared these set-forth Objectives and Outcomes with the students and discussed these in great detail with them during classroom teaching. The students have always been encouraged to properly understand these objectives and have a clear and vivid understanding.**

Response:

The Attainment of POs and COs is typically evaluated to assess the effectiveness of a Program or Course in achieving its intended learning objectives. This evaluation is of paramount importance for continuous improvement and improvization.

Just as the designing of the Program and Course Objectives was the point of commencement of the entire Teaching-Learning process, the evaluation of their attainment has to be the culmination point. The **Attainment levels of the designed Outcomes have to be evaluated in a robust, scientific and comprehensive manner.** The Outcomes are the set of Objectives that a student should be attaining or acquiring when successfully qualifying the Final Semester (that is UG Semester-VI or PG Semester-IV) Examination. The various methods employed for evaluation of Attainment of these POs, PSOs, COs can be classified into 2 broad categories –

1. **Direct Attainment Evaluation Strategies**
2. **Indirect Attainment Evaluation Strategies**

The methods employed for evaluation of Attainment are as follows –

1. End-Semester Examination results

Detailed Analysis of End-Semester Examination results provide a vivid picture regarding the Attainment of the laid down POs, PSOs, COs. Detailed analysis of the Results are attached.

2. Internal Examination results

Analysis of the Internal Examination results provides a basis for evaluation of attainment and planning for the future remaining span of the Semester.

3. Academic Progression related Departmental Faculty Members' Meetings

The Faculty Members convene Departmental meetings to evaluate Academic Progression of the students. These meetings are generally held after the Internal Examinations in each Semester. Thus there are 02 such **Departmental Academic Progression related Faculties' Meetings** in a Academic Year (that is one for the Odd Semesters and one for the Even Semesters). The Resolutions of these meetings are enclosed.

4. Students Performance and Attainment Mapping Software Portal

The college uses a **Web-portal for mapping the Courses to PSOs and for grading all the Final semester students** in accordance with the laid down PSOs. The portal uses a well-defined Algorithm for computing the **Attainment Score** of each Student of the college based on both CGPA and the Faculty

members' Grades.

Attainment Score = 80% of CGPA + 20% of Faculty given grade

This score gives a robust idea regarding the Attainment levels and it is evaluated for each and every student passing out of the College.

5. Progression to Higher education

Students' progression to Higher Education serves as an important metric for Attainment evaluation. Joyful Learning, an Educational Outreach Program designed to provide **academic support for the children of neighboring Eight Primary Schools under the jurisdiction of Chandernagore Municipal Corporation.** The main objective of the programme is to provide **an enjoyable, pleasant classroom learning atmosphere** through joyful teaching-learning process for the school kids as well as develop a **sense of social responsibility and sensitivity among our college students serving as resource persons** in this **unique Teaching-Learning process.**

II. Institutional Social Responsibility: “Haate-Kolome Vigyan”

The Science Departments of Chandernagore College collectively organized **Hands-On Exposure to Laboratory Environment and Practical Demonstration Programmes** for the **Neighboring Secondary School Students (Class X) And Higher Secondary School Students (Class XII Science Section)** to expose them to various practical demonstrations under improved laboratory conditions as well as encourage them to pursue Higher Studies in Basic Sciences.

III. Community Service Projects by NSS Unit, Chandernagore College

In collaboration with Sangbed, “**Care for Elders**” was operationalised in 24 households of Chandannagar not only for providing immediate requirements but also emotional support and comfort. Goswamighat Prabartak Aponalay Children’s Home, abode of destitute children had served as the place for regular visit to conduct **Tutorial classes, building up a Library Resource, Innovative and Engaging Science, Social Science, Language and Mathematics Workshops**.

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1

The Institution has adequate infrastructure and other facilities for,

- teaching – learning, viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc
- ICT – enabled facilities such as smart class, LMS etc.

Facilities for Cultural and sports activities, yoga centre, games (indoor and outdoor), Gymnasium, auditorium etc (Describe the adequacy of facilities in maximum of 500 words.)

Response:

Since 2017, relentless attempts have been made by the College authority to accommodate continuous growth for which infrastructural improvements have become necessary and the College achieved several milestones with continuous financial support from the Department of Higher Education and National schemes such as Rashtriya Uchchar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA 2.0).

Teaching – learning and ICT – enabled facilities

- The college currently has 77 classrooms for catering to the needs of students across 19 UG courses and PG courses. Some of the rooms are endowed with fixed projectors for ICT enabled teaching learning practices. Many departments are also endowed with portable projectors which are regularly used for conducting classes in different classrooms of both campuses.
- The Departments of Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Environmental Science and Geography have their own laboratories with state of the art equipments and elaborate specimen collections.
- The Department of Physics has **1 Optical Lab, 1 Electrical & Electronics Lab, 1 Thermal Lab and 1 General Lab.**
- The Department of Chemistry has **1 General Chemistry Laboratory, 1 Organic Chemistry Laboratory, 1 Inorganic Chemistry Laboratory, 2 Physical Chemistry Laboratories and 1 Instruments room.**
- The Department of Botany has a **Biochemistry Laboratory a Microbiology Laboratory and a Specimen Preparation Laboratory.** There is also a garden of medicinal herbs. There are also **3 laboratories cum classrooms.**
- The Department of Zoology has the **Satya Sundar Barman Instrumentation Centre** and a RUSA funded **Common Research Laboratory for Biological Sciences.** There are also aquariums.
- The Department of Geography has 5 laboratories. **2 Computer/Software Training Laboratories** for working on software like **Quantum- Geographic Information System, Erdas Imagine, Arc View (Arc GIS+ Arc Map+ Arc Info) etc., 1 Soil-Analysis/Pedological Study-lab, 1 Map (Topographical Map/ Aerial Photo/ Satellite Imageries) Laboratory and 1 Instrument-training laboratory (Transit Theodolite, Dumpy level, Auto-level etc.).**
- The Department of Computer Science has a laboratory with 14 desktops, a laptop and various modern softwares.

- The college has a **Learning Management System (LMS)** and **Language Lab** for all teachers and students.
- The college has **3 diesel generator sets** and a **dedicated transformer** for uninterrupted teaching-learning procedures.

Facilities for Cultural and sports activities, yoga centre, games (indoor and outdoor), Gymnasium, auditorium etc

1. The institution has a newly developed Student Activity Centre for physical exercise, yoga and other related activities. Training equipments are also available. Yoga training is also regularly conducted with external trainers.
2. Furthermore, the college regularly hosts various cultural programmes to mark the occasion of Teachers' Day on 5th September. During the pandemic, the departments have also sought to encourage the cultural activities of the students by hosting different programmes online. Some departments, such as the Department of English, have even started a website (ccdecreatives.wordpress.com) to showcase the poems, paintings or musical performances and recitations of the students.
3. The college also regularly organizes annual sports for students and staff at Kuthir Math which the college is entitled to use for 2 days every week.
4. The departments also regularly host wall magazines featuring the contributions of the students on diverse areas of interest.
5. Apart from these, the Students' Union also hosts Freshers' Welcome and other cultural activities which are generally held at the nearby Rabindra Bhaban auditorium which is large enough to accommodate students across semesters.
6. There is a calendar of extracurricular activities which the College uses to coordinate different cultural events
7. Keeping health and hygiene as the topmost priority, the college washrooms have been renovated and there are **disabled-friendly washrooms** maintained by housekeeping staff

The College Library started in the year 1931, the year in which the College Duplex was reopened after a gap of 23 year, with 500 Books, mostly donated by eminent local individuals and teachers. Currently it has more than **1 lakh 15 thousand books**. Chandernagore College Library system consists of one Central Library and 16 Seminar Libraries (i.e. Departmental Libraries for Honours Departments). The Central Library is situated at the Ground Floor of Administrative Building of the College with an area of 6500 sq. ft. Both open and closed access systems have been maintained simultaneously. Apart from the circulation of books, the library also provides a reading room for students and teachers, reprographic service (as and when required), access to e-learning resources and career guidance corner consisting of preparatory books related to competitive examinations. It also a prestigious internationally acknowledged **rare book collection** donated by eminent philanthropist late Harihar Sett.

The library subscribes to Shodhganga, National Digital Library and other repositories of e-resources. It also subscribes to 4 separate journals across different streams.
- **The Library encourages the use of the many websites for accession of e-resources.**
- **5 LAN-connected** desktops have been installed in the library with Wi-Fi and internet facilities through LAN. These computers are used to access the various library resources to which the College has subscribed.

4.3 IT Infrastructure

4.3.1

Response:

- Chandernagore College initiated the process of enhanced E-governance through the introduction of **Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software** from 2017 through a stand-alone mother server connecting all terminals located in the college office through **LAN**. As with other HEIs Chandernagore College also uses ERP to collect, monitor and utilize students' data for their entire tenure in the institution from the submission of application forms to graduation. It manages all related processes of admission, registration, enrollment, submission of fees, application and distribution of scholarships and other financial data management for various schemes of student welfare and assorted academic assignments. From 2022 the College has upgraded the ERP system to a cloud-based framework which enables round-the-clock data management from any location.
- Furthermore, the college has also stopped printing hard copies of notices which are directly uploaded on to the College website. Intimations of all uploaded notices are shared with students and teachers through the **ColloSol** application which sends SMS to students with links of notices while faculty members are informed via system-generated bulk-emails. This process ensures perfect communication of all relevant information to all stakeholders with complete transparency while maintaining exact documentation and preventing problems caused by asymmetric dissemination of information.
- The **ColloSol** application was also used during the pandemic to generate online links for classes which were then communicated to concerned students of specific courses through notifications sent to them via the Chandernagore College mobile app. This enhanced the online-teaching learning process during the pandemic.
- The college regularly procures updated computers and related accessories for the smooth functioning of academic and administrative activities in the college which is evident from a large

number of desktops and laptops which are now available in the college and the number of such devices has almost doubled during the course of the last 5 years. Such devices are also connected with **high-speed internet (around 100 mbps) through a campus-wide Wi-Fi network.**

- All such devices, accessories, and networks are subjected to regular maintenance, and repairing and maintenance are done as per requirement throughout the year. Most of the available devices also run on the latest Operating Systems and are equipped with anti-virus software for data protection.
- The library too is benefitting from such updated IT facilities as it attempts to digitize books, enter the records of books into the **KOHA** software, and provide remote access to teachers and students of the records through digital catalogue via **OPAC.**
- Various departments regularly require the use of computer labs with subject-specific software for teaching-learning purposes which are made possible by the available resources and they also aid in academic research by the faculty members. During the confirmation in service (W.B.E.S.) of a teacher, the HOI sends a Special Confidential Report of that teacher to the DPI.

- **Self Appraisal Report (S.A.R. Online)**

Each year all the teachers under W.B.E.S. and librarians have to submit their online S.A.R. through WBIFMS to HOI. The HOI forwards those to the DPI with proper endorsement. The SAR of officers under W.B.S.E.S. are submitted directly to DPI.

- **PBAS**

Performance Based Appraisal System is followed for promotion under CAS of the Teachers and Librarian.

- **Performance Report for Group-B and Group-C Employees**

The HOI prepares the Performance Report for Group-B and Group-C Employees during their promotion.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1

Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The college submits a budget in the form of proposals involving different components like, Plan-Head, Non-Plan Head, Infrastructure Development, etc. and receives the budgeted amount from the Higher Education Department, Government of West Bengal and RUSA 2.0 Project. After receiving the grants, the college mobilizes funds as per strategic planning, which was developed at the time of preparation of

the budget. The college authority always boosts up all the members including teaching, non-teaching, and contractual staff to utilize these funds in due time in an optimal manner. The college prepares utilization certificates as per grants sanctioned and submits it in due time to the appropriate authorities. The college also acquires Non-Government Fund from students' admission and submit a part of it to Treasury, Govt. of WB through TR-7 Form. The residual part of this fund is utilized in an optimal manner for the utmost benefits of the students and different stakeholders. College also accumulates fund for conducting Public Examinations suc as WBCS, SET, TET etc. In this way, the college authority tries to ensure maximum utilization of available funds.

The college conducts internal as well as external audits properly at justified intervals of time. External Audit is conducted by Office of the Principal Accountant General (General & Social Sector Audit), West Bengal. The utilization of funds from RUSA 2.0 Project is audited by the Higher Education Department, Govt. of West Bengal. UGC & other Project Audit is done by a reputed Chartered Accountant firm. The Authority also conducts internal audit of different Non-Govt. collections through a reputed Chartered Accountant firm.

The External Audit, conducted by the Office of the Principal Accountant General (General & Social Sector Audit), West Bengal, was done for the period from 01-04-2017 to 31-12-2019. A few queries were raised by Auditors and the authority provided prompt reply with proper documentations in due time. Ultimately Auditors were satisfied with all the replies from the Authority. This kind of Government Audit for the next period of time is awaited.

However, the college also conducted Audits of Govt. fund and various non-Government funds in this period simultaneously.

College has traditionally maintained Gender Equity as it is a co-educational college. The ratio of male to female in the college is equitable in science. Arts stream has the greater percentage of female students. The college enthusiastically processes the Kanyashree Award of the Government of West Bengal and it has received an award in 2020 for providing the highest number of **Kanyashree award** to girl students in the district.

Facilities for Women in the Campus: The College has recently constructed dedicated **Girls' Activity Centre** in Gurudeb Bhawan Campus for the Girls students to provide facilities required for Girl students for hygiene and cleanliness.

The **Girls' Hostel** named '**Khanika**' of the college is another important addition. It has the capacity for 40 Girl's boarders. Hostel Committee works under the supervision of senior lady professor to look after the Girl's boarders daily facilities. There are three lady security guards round the clock for their security.

Kanyashree Scholarships (K2-UG level and K3-PG level) exclusively for Girl child has been executed and recommended through the college office.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1

Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

Distinctiveness of Chandernagore College:

Chandernagore College have its unique origin, unique role in *Freedom Movement*, have a distinct *Centre for research activities on Heritage*, Unique *College Museum* and its role in transferring knowledge, unique type of *Social outreach programmes* in different sectors and unique type of *Research Training Programme* for UG students constitutes the distinctiveness of this institute :

- 1. Origin and Uniqueness of Chandernagore College:** *Chandernagore College is a unique institution which has had to sacrifice 23 years (1908-1931) of its history because of its involvement in the struggle for independence.* Germinating as Ecole de Saint Marie, a primary school established by French Jesuit priest Magloire Barthelet **on 31st August 1862**
- 2. Role of Chandernagore College in Indian Revolutionary Activities against British Rulers:** The erstwhile *Deputy Director of College Duplex*, *Shri Charu Chandra Roy was the principal source behind the dissemination of revolutionary ideals in Chandernagore. Rash Behari Bose, an alumnus of Chandernagore College, later went to Japan to orchestrate revolutionary activities from abroad and masterminded the establishment of Netaji Subhash Chandra Bose's INA.* Chandernagore College functioned as a catalyst that sharpened and intensified all these activities and networks.
- 3. Re-opening of Chandernagore College after 23 years of closure:** *Professor Charu Chandra Roy later became the Mayor of Chandernagore in 1928 and his tireless work, along with that of several others, eventually led to the re-opening of College Duplex in 1931* on account of the importance of this college in the educational scenario.
- 4. Inclusion of Chandernagore College under India Government & State Government:** After Chandernagore was formally integrated with India in 1952, the college was administered briefly by the Department of External Affairs, Government of India and then from 2nd October, 1954 the college came under the direct administration of the Government of West Bengal.
- 5. Establishment and role of Centre for Heritage Studies, Chandernagore College:** It is this commitment which led to the formation, in 2022, of the *Centre for Heritage Studies has received endorsement from both the University of Burdwan and the West Bengal Heritage Commission (WBHC). The Centre had also submitted a proposal to the WBHC for declaring a section of the Chandernagore Strand, from the Rani Ghat to the Patalbari as a heritage precinct, to preserve the architectural heritage of the locality, which the West Bengal Heritage Commission approved.*
- 6. Role of Chandernagore College Museum in transferring knowledge to the students & visitors on Indian Revolutionary Activities occurred in Chandannagar:** It is as part of this commitment to the history and heritage of Chandernagore that the *College has also established the Chandernagore College Museum, under the aegis of the Centre for Heritage Studies, which focuses on the revolutionary activities emanating from Chandernagore College in particular and the City of Chandernagore in general.* It is through such commemoration of its distinctive history through consistent contemporary activities that Chandernagore College would continue to uniquely serve its community and open new horizons of knowledge.

7. Unique type of Extension Activities carried out by Chandernagore College:

Chandernagore College designed and executed several unique type of extension and social outreach programmes in the local community-

I. Institutional Social Responsibility: “Joyful Learning”

Joyful Learning is an Educational Outreach Program designed to provide academic support for the children of Eight Primary Schools under the jurisdiction of Chandernagore Municipal Corporation.

II. Institutional Social Responsibility: “Haate-Kolome Vigyan”

The Science Departments collectively organized Hands-On Exposure to Laboratory Environment and Practical Demonstration Programmes for the Neighboring School Students of Class X and XII.

Local environmental condition was analysed and acted upon with intervention of **Mangrove plantation programmes in two phases on the west bank of river Hooghly at Chandannagar** by the college students and staff to prevent bank erosion and promote protection of the healthy eco-system.

VII. Philanthropic Activities: Felicitate **MS. Piyali Basak, the famous Mt. Everest renowned Everest Summiteer from Chandannagar**, with a token financial support of Rs.50000/- to her for her exclusive and inimitable global achievements.

8. Unique type of Research Training Programme for UG-Students: Know Your Ganges at Chandannagar is an unique an innovative project formulated and executed by Chandernagore College involving the *Semester-V Honours students of Botany, Zoology, Chemistry and Environmental Science subjects*. This project gives *training on primary research activities like sample collection, preservation, field data collection, laboratory experiments, data analysis by using software's and research manuscript writing* to UG students of the above mentioned departments.
